THE THIRD KING Solomon

What Are the Odds?

- Of you being born exactly you, at this moment in history?
 ~1 in 10 to the 2,685,000th power
- Of you being conceived?~1 in 400 Trillion
- Of every single one of your ancestors surviving long enough to reproduce... Of your parents meeting and staying together long enough to have you?
 Incalculable

You are a statistical miracle.

- Oh yes, you shaped me first inside, then out; you formed me in my mother's womb.
- I thank you, High God—

 Body and soul, I am (**fearfully and wonderfully**) made!

 I worship in adoration—what a creation!
- You know me inside and out, you know every bone in my body;
- You know exactly how I was made, bit by bit, how I was sculpted from nothing into something.
- Like an open book, you watched me grow from conception to birth; all the stages of my life were spread out before you,
- The days of my life all prepared before I'd even lived one day. (Psalm 139:13-16, The Message)

Fearfully and Wonderfully Made

- Expresses a sense of awe and wonder at the complex, intricate design of human life—recognizing it as a creation of God.
- Suggests that each individual is uniquely crafted with care and intention (i.e., intrinsic worth, unique identity and significance)

- Roark (Grandfather, USA) + Owen (Grandmother, USA)= Dorothy (my mother)
- Tripoli (GF—Sicily, Italy) + Katz (GM—Kiev, Russia:Jewish)
 Immigrants
 - = Ned Tripoli, (my biological father)
- Dorothy (USA) + Ned (Italian, Russian Jew)
 - = Me:-)

In 1961, ~5.3% of all births in the US were to unmarried women.

- Bearing such a child was viewed as immoral, scandalous or shameful
- Birth certificates might be stamped with an "illegitimate" mark
- Some states denied them inheritance rights or parental recognition
- Access to public benefits was minimal, and often restricted by moral criteria—women perceived as "morally unfit" could be denied aid
- Marrying a man—even if not the biological father—was often seen as her only way to financial survival, housing, and social respectability

- I was such a child—born out of wedlock in 1961
- Dorothy (my mother) + Jorge Ymaz (my legal father)
 Hispanic: lived for a time in Mexico City; maybe from Spain (?)
 - = Jorge John Mark Ymaz (on my birth certificate)

 But from the day I was born, she called me Mark

- Jorge Ymaz (my legal father)
 - Moved to Cali, Columbia just after I was born
 - My mother chose to stay in the USA and raise me here
- So, my mom then changed the spelling of her (our) name—
 Dorothy de Ymaz & Mark de Ymaz—Why?
 - Her husband was Hispanic or of Spanish descent, and she adopted a traditional, cultural naming norm.
 - She was active in Catholic, diplomatic & international social circles, where European naming forms were familiar & respected.

- Through college, I spelled it Mark de Ymaz
 - The name was repeatedly butchered, but I got used to it;-)
 - I told people to pronounce it "di—MAHZ", like Joe DiMaggio

But...

In college, there was a Mark DeMoss AND a Mark DeMos!
 I observed people didn't have trouble pronouncing their names

So...

Mark DeYmaz

Pronounced "Deh—MAUZ", the "Y" is silent

Solomon—Have You Ever Wondered?

- David (his father) + Bathsheba (his mother)
 - When they first became involved, Bathsheba was the wife of Uriah the Hittite (an ethnic Jew, a cultural Hittite)
 - While Uriah was at war on behalf of the king, David committed adultery with Bathsheba
 - David then arranged for Uriah to be placed on the front lines of battle and ordered his troops to withdraw, ensuring Uriah would be killed
 - Their first child died shortly after birth (2 Samuel 12:15–18).

Solomon—Have You Ever Wondered?

- David (his father) + Bathsheba (his mother)
 - = Solomon
 - He was not viewed as illegitimate, though the relationship of his parents was forged in sin
 - God even gave him the name Jedidiah—"beloved of the Lord"—through Nathan the prophet (2 Samuel 12:24–25).
 - A powerful biblical example of God's redemptive grace overriding human failure

Solomon—King of Israel The third and final king of the United Kingdom

- He was made by God the wisest person who has ever lived (I Kings 3:12; II Kings 4:29-31)
- He became the greatest of wealth, fame, and influence of his time (I Kings 10:23, 24)
- He set out to discover the purpose and meaning of life (Ecclesiastes)

I, the Teacher, have been king over Israel in Jerusalem.

I applied my mind to examine and explore through wisdom all that is done under heaven ...

I have seen all the things that are done under the sun and have found everything to be futile, a pursuit of the wind. *Ecclesiastes 1:12-14*
